Learning from the Shepherds

As we transition from the season of Christmas into Epiphany, I hope you'll keep the joy of Christmas in your hearts throughout the coming year.

One of my favorite books to read at Christmas time is *Martin Luther's Christmas Book* edited by Roland H. Bainton. This year, as I revisited its pages, the chapter entitled 'Shepherds' resonated with me in a special way. It prompted me to wonder: Why did God choose to announce the most important gift we would ever be given to a group of shepherds? And why was this good news shared with the shepherds near the small town of Bethlehem? What lessons can we draw from their response to these glad tidings?

Shepherds occupied the lowest rung of the social ladder. They were not highly esteemed in society, lacked positions of influence, and possessed little in terms of material wealth. Their lives were spent in tireless labor, caring for flocks of sheep—animals often dismissed as slow and unintelligent. This raises the question: why would God select shepherds to be the very first to hear the news of the Savior's birth?

Yet, these are the very ones that God lifted up. Perhaps they were more faithful. Perhaps they were content doing the work required of a shepherd. More likely, God knew that we all need the Good Shepherd and what an example these shepherds give us.

God sent Jesus into the world to dwell among us, offering His presence to lead and guide us through life. Jesus came not only to guide, but also to sacrifice Himself for our sake, so that through His death, we could be completely reconciled to God. On that first Christmas, this extraordinary gift was revealed in a spectacular way—angels filled the sky with song, and radiant lights announced the birth. In this moment, God made it clear that this gift was meant for everyone: for you, for me, and for shepherds—those whom society might overlook or deem unworthy. No one was excluded from God's invitation; the joy and hope brought by Jesus was offered to all people, regardless of their status or background.

The story of the shepherds serves as a remarkable example of steadfast faithfulness. Even though they were initially overwhelmed by fear at the sight of the angels, the shepherds listened intently to the message spoken to them. Moved by what they had heard, they hurried to Bethlehem, eager to witness the fulfillment of this extraordinary proclamation.

Their response required great courage and commitment; they left behind their flocks—their very means of livelihood—to see for themselves what had taken place. This act was not only a demonstration of their faith, but also of their willingness to set aside personal concerns in order to be part of something far greater.

Upon seeing the newborn child, the shepherds could not keep the news to themselves. They shared what they had experienced with others, and those who heard their story were astonished by the message. As recorded in Luke 2:18 (NRSV), "And all who heard it were

amazed at what the shepherds told them.” The shepherds seized the opportunity to spread the Good News, ensuring that the joy and wonder of the event would reach beyond themselves to all those around them.

As we reflect on the shepherds’ response to the announcement of Jesus’ birth, we are reminded that God calls each of us to share the joy of this great gift. Most of us have just celebrated Christmas with festive lights, abundant food, and joyful gatherings. We exchanged gifts, sang songs, and enjoyed time with loved ones.

However, looking to the example of the shepherds, there is something more to be learned. We should not miss the opportunity to tell others about the incredible gift of God’s love, which is meant for *all* people. Like the shepherds, we may sometimes feel hesitant or afraid to share the gospel, but it is important to remember that this experience was new for them as well. Instead of letting chances pass by, let us, like the shepherds, respond with eagerness and courage. We are invited to share all that we know about Jesus, our Lord and Good Shepherd. It does not matter who we are or where we come from—just as the shepherds were ordinary people from Bethlehem, so too are we called to tell the story of God’s love for us, a love that endures now and forever.



Duties of the Ushers

(reviewed on 3/2022)

1. Arrive at church 30 minutes prior to service.
2. Turn Sanctuary lights on and off before and after service.
3. Raise and lower shades on windows before and after service.
4. Put up hymn numbers (numbers are in room to left of altar in cupboard).
5. Turn on the Cross at altar (switch is labeled in room to the right of altar).
6. Turn lamps on for the Lectern and Pulpit. Turn off after service.
7. Fill ceramic pitcher with water and place on baptismal font along with silver bowl that goes in the baptismal font (pitcher and bowl are located in room to the left of altar on the counter by sink).
8. Hand out bulletins, newsletters, etc.
9. Ring church bell at least 3 times just before beginning of the service.
10. Count the number of people attending the service (easily done from the balcony sometime after service has begun) (number in attendance is to be written in the book which is in the fellowship hall).
11. Receive offering plates, gathering offering, and bring offering forward when pastor signals.
12. Usher people forward for Holy Communion (one usher stands towards the front to allow worshipers to advance to front).
13. Usher people out when church service has concluded.
